We are pleased to announce the general call for project proposals to the *Environmental Humanities Congress-in-Place*. This is an opportunity to share and discuss your work at this unique four-day event, June 19-22 on the southern shores of Lake Michigan. The Graduate Student Paper Competition application process, which has just closed, was very successful, so we are genuinely excited about the diverse projects and energy graduate student researchers will bring to the Congress. We now ask all interested researchers—faculty, independent scholars, environmental professionals, community leaders—to submit project proposals to present at this event. The theme of the Congress is "Wonder and Contradiction."

The deadline for your proposals (a 300-500 word abstract) is **February 1,** 2025. Given the diversity of approaches to the environmental humanities, we are accepting presentation proposals in as many styles, formats and modalities as can reasonably be accommodated. We encourage region-focused themes given the place-based nature of this event, but we welcome your ongoing research projects as well. Panel, roundtable, exhibition, performance, and discussion formats will be set up to encourage sharing, discussion, and collaboration.
